STUDY SKILLS: Know what to expect

Before you start reading something new, try to think what you are expecting to read about. Take clues from the title, pictures, the purpose of the text and the reason you are reading it. This will make you better prepared for reading.

This Reading Worksheet looks at predicting the content of a reading text. Here, you will have the opportunity to practise using clues to help you predict what a text contains.


