If you have studied other skills in this series, you might have looked at how to **Write sentences**, **Link sentences** and **Write paragraphs**. Here we will look in detail at what a supporting argument is. Basically, a supporting argument is a sentence which supports the topic sentence of a paragraph. It can do this in a number of ways, such as adding detail or giving an explanation.

The academic context

Good academic writing has an interplay between statements and supporting arguments. It is balanced, ordered and easily understood. This is the kind of writing that will get you top marks at college or university.

Key features

A supporting argument can:

- explain the topic sentence, or show why it is important
- give examples, reasons, details, facts or statistics (evidence)
- give a quote (repeating words somebody has written or said) or paraphrase (repeating something in different words)
- sum up the previous sentence
- develop an important theme

Challenges / difficulties

A supporting argument needs to be well written and integrated into a paragraph. This means you need to read back over your work and check that your arguments give good support. Does each supporting argument clearly relate to the topic of the paragraph? Does it develop your overall argument or theme?

How can I develop this skill?

When you read, pay attention to how the sentences in each paragraph support the main idea. See if you can identify what kind of support each argument gives, using the Key features section to help you. Remember that a supporting argument can be one sentence or several sentences.

Learning outcome

When you have learnt this skill, you will feel more confident writing and editing supporting arguments for your own pieces of writing. You will be more familiar with different kinds of supporting arguments, such as those that explain or those that add details.
